The parents' group said they would like clearer information about after-school clubs and other activities, and also asked us to ensure that the first few days are made easier, particularly in practical issues such as being able to pay for food, access lockers, understand the times of the day, etc. I can assure you that we will address all of these issues.

It was also great to hear some of the comments that students were making about their first days in Year 7, such as: *"The day goes so quickly because we are having so much fun!"*

As you will see when you read through this newsletter, a great deal has happened this year beyond the timetabled lessons, and I'm sure you would join me in thanking the staff for the work they do in this regard.

One of the major events that we all reflected on this term was the one hundredth anniversary of the end of

the First World War.

A programme of assemblies and tutor activities was developed by the History department to mark the centenary, and the picture on page 4 shows the cross that was assembled with poppies made in tutor groups, each with a handwritten message from one of our students.

There is more information about how we marked the centenary in the pages that follow.

Finally, and as you will already know, we were recently visited by two inspectors who were particularly looking at the Catholic life and RE teaching in the College.

Many thanks to the parents that responded to the questionnaire. We will receive the inspectors' report early in the New Year and it will be made available to parents as soon as it is published.

Year 11 achieved some fantastic results, particularly given this event is normally entered by older students. Congratulations to Magdalena Howell and Ines Przychodzka who were both awarded silver certificates, with Magdalena also receiving the 'Best in School' award. Congratulations also go to Natalia Brzozowska, Raj Burman and Alina Afonso who were all awarded the bronze certificates.

# Crown Court Competition

Fifteen students from Year 10 took part in the Bar Crown Court Mock Trial Competition on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> November at Oxford Crown Court.

The national competition is run by The Citizenship Foundation with the aim of increasing awareness of the Criminal Justice System and its processes, as well as promoting inclusion in the legal profession. It also has the added benefit of developing team work, independence, communication skills, memory and quick thinking.

Each student had to take on a role in the court consisting of four barristers (two being prosecution, two defence), four witnesses, a court clerk, an usher, five jurors and two substitutes, with the case being presided over by a real judge.

Each student played a very important role; witnesses had to learn the facts within their statements and remain steadfast in the face of questions from some extremely interrogative barristers from the opposing teams, whilst barristers had to find holes in the case and exploit these in order to build their arguments.

The main aim was to present vital information and display to the mock jury and (real) judge why the defendant was guilty or not guilty. The court clerk and usher also had important roles to ensure that the trial ran smoothly and was not disrupted. The jury had to be unbiased and make a verdict based on the evidence that was presented to them in the trial.

St. Joseph's competed against three different schools (including a two-time finalist) and placed as one of the runner ups: a significant achievement, given it was St. Joseph's first time taking part in the competition and they were amongst the youngest students taking part.

The team should be highly commended for the amount of independent work that they put in to preparing two cases for trial and for their performance on the day, not to mention for the early start to get to Oxford in time for the competition!

The team excelled themselves and were rewarded with some inspirational photo stops at several of the Oxford Colleges: locations that some of them may well be studying at in the not-too-distant future.

# Year 9 Challenge Day

The Year 9 Challenge Day was an interschool event that consisted of problem solving activities in different subject areas. It involved critical thinking, logical reasoning, problem solving and team work. There were six participating schools.

There were six different rounds that consisted of critical thinking, poetry writing, code breaking, escape the room, Tangrametrix and logic puzzles. Twelve Year 9 students, split into two teams of six, were chosen to represent the school at this event.

Both teams performed brilliantly on every round. One of the teams won two of the rounds on Critical Thinking and Logic Puzzles. A sonnet written by one of our students, Linus Davies, for the poetry writing round was read out during the award giving ceremony. It was remarked upon by the judging teacher, as one of the best she had come across that had been written in a very short time. The other team came second on most of the rounds.

The students realised it was not just their own skills that mattered but it was equally important to work as a team. All students had to work very hard throughout the day on various challenges in different subject areas.

For the overall prizes, scores of both teams were added and St. Joseph's were the winners of the Year 9 Challenge Day.

# Remembrance Day

## Science Enrichment

What an exciting and interesting term it's been in Science this term. The after-school STEM club has enjoyed having guest speakers come in from the University of Bristol Dinosaur Project and GameDr to inform and enrich their STEM interests. Dr Rhys Charles and his colleagues, Catherine and Mike, travelled in from the University of Bristol to run a workshop for our students on 'How to Read Rocks'.

Rhys and his team from the Bristol Dinosaur Project led our students in finding out the hidden stories of the hillsides, cliffs, and valleys that many of us see every day. With evidence from the rocks themselves they were able to piece together the history of our world millions of years before us, revealing the creatures that lived there and the alien environments they called home.

A few weeks later, we had another visit this time from Dr Carla Brown, also known as GameDr. As a scientist turned social entrepreneur, Dr Brown has dedicated her career to the development of innovative digital media for science and health education.

Carla's background is in microbiology and during her PhD at University of Glasgow, her research focused on the development of new antibiotics from human gut bacteria. It was during her PhD studies that Carla identified a need for alternative tools to educate on antibiotic resistance and designed an innovative gaming app, 'Bacteria Combat'. Fuelled by the success of this project, she then designed 'Poo Racing', a racing app to educate on the human gut at Centre of the Cell, Queen Mary University London.

These exciting projects led her to launch GameDr. where she continues to investigate different types of persuasive media for STEM engagement. Student had the opportunity to talk to Dr Brown about careers involving science as well as develop their skills as app developers. Both visits were very popular and the speakers were impressed with our students and the interest they showed in STEM and are keen to revisit us at St Joseph's with further workshops.

We would welcome any students interested STEM to our STEM club that runs every Wednesday 3pm until 4pm in B02.
